On August 31, Bruce Tanner was honored to submit the Westmore Association's petition to ban wake sports on Lake Willoughby to the Department of Environmental Conservation. We cannot thank our community and members enough for their support. We obtained more than 500 signatures and countless letters of support. The love for our lake and community runs deep. Special thanks to Diane Lehder and other members for their dedication to organizing the petition.

We now invite you to participate in the public hearing on the Association's petition to prohibit wake sports on Lake Willoughby, happening December 10th in Newport and virtually for those unable to be in person. Please consider joining us and the other local lake associations to ensure your voice is heard to ban wakesports before a decision is made. ### <u>Castleton Quartet</u>



### Trails and Recreation

We feel grateful for the ability to once again pledge \$2,500 for the NorthWoods Conservation Corps to be used on trails and conservation projects in the Westmore Area. This summer, the crews, which consisted of high school backcountry, sustainable forestry, conservation services, and adult professional conservation corps, completed work on Bald Mtn, Mt Hor, Mt Pisgah, and Wheeler Mountain. This ongoing pledge allows us to continue our partnership to maintain and preserve our natural resources for generations ahead. We're also excited to once again participate in the annual Westmore Mountain Challenge. Our station at the CCC Overlook was welcomed by participants and a fun time was had by all!

From Maria Young, NorthWoods Executive Director: It is a lesson in sustainable trails to see the ongoing work on the Pisgah North Trail. Here, what was formerly a steep straight up the mountain trail has been rerouted in many sections to incorporate sustainable grades, more switchback and improved drainage. If you hike with this in mind, you can see where the former trail has been replaced with a more sustainable grade for pleasant hiking and most importantly erosion control.

We also wanted to acknowledge the work of the Vermont Department of Forests, Parks & Recreation for their ongoing efforts to make Willoughby South End site improvements. As visitors continue to grow, it's imperative that we improve safety and accessibility and maintain environmental quality.

Members from the Northeast Kingdom Section of the Green Mountain Club are also critical of the maintenance of our trail systems. Often gone unnoticed, the trail adopters are out there assisting with blow downs, assessing damage, and breaking trail. They also host a variety of hikes for community members to join. # Greeter & Milfoil Program

Our Greeter season ran from Memorial Day to Labor Day, during which we had 10 Greeters participating in the program. All Greeters and staff completed online training with Olin Reed from the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation. Thanks to an additional donation from the Westmore Association, we raised the Greeter hourly pay rate to \$20. The Westmore Association and The Town of Westmore each contributed to expanding the Greeter Program to a 7-day schedule for July and August.

During the season, we inspected 2,206 watercraft, the majority of which had outboard motors; 40 were wake boats. Our Greeters removed plant material from 143 boats, including 21 that had invasive Eurasian Water Milfoil eliminated. The Greeter Program plays a vital role in keeping Lake Willoughby free of invasive species and safeguarding other bodies of water.

In July, Swampguana Diving Services began suction harvesting aquatic invasive Eurasian Water Milfoil and will continue this effort through October. They have targeted areas such as the Boat Launch, Crescent Beach, Gallagher's Cabins, the NE Shoreline/Willoughvale, the NW Shoreline/North Beach, and Gray Rock to the Boat Launch. So far, no other invasive species have been reported. A final report will be submitted once the harvest is completed. Previous years' results from the Milfoil Management Program indicate a significant yearly reduction in the spread of invasive Milfoil, highlighting the importance of these efforts for aquatic nuisance control in Lake Willoughby.

Furthermore, thanks to the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation and assistance from the Memphremagog Watershed Association, the Town of Westmore received a grant of \$15,978 for the Greeter Program and \$10,305 for the Milfoil Management Program. The Westmore Association also contributed \$10,111 to the Greeter Program.

# Water Quality Committee By Bruce Tanner

The two "100-year" floods that occurred the past two summers here at Westmore were a stark reminder to us all that we should be anticipating (and preparing for!) more, and bigger storms in our future, as the climate continues to change. Those of us who own shoreline property on Willoughby Lake, or who own property through which runs a Willoughby tributary brook, should be particularly concerned. With likely increases in strength and duration of future storms, fragile stream banks and lake shorelines could be in jeopardy of increased erosion and possible failures. There is also the potential for more fertilizers, herbicides, and/or pesticides running off lakeside lawns into the lake with bigger storms.


Fortunately, there is helping to be had. For those who own lake shoreland property, there is the Lake Wise Program, managed by the Vermont Dept. of Environmental Conservation. This is a free program promoting best management practices on lakeside landscapes. If you are curious about this program and want more details, please go online and visit the following website:

For those with tributary brooks running through, or adjacent, to their property, we now have a Lake Watershed Action Plan for Willoughby Lake's watershed in hand. Over 70 locations within our watershed have been found in need of remediation. To find out if any of these locations is on your property A link to the Willoughby LWAP can be found at the following website: https://www.vacd.org/lake-willoughby-action-plan/. Please pay particular attention to the appendices, and especially to appendix D, where all the locations are tabled in a rather large spreadsheet. Folks at the Memphremagog Watershed Association and the Orleans County Natural Resources Conservation District are ready to help with identifying, and applying to, granting organizations to help with remediation costs.

The Eurasian Water Milfoil harvest for 2024 totaled 3,942 gallons at a cost of \$22,000. This compares well with previous years' totals (see fig. 1). We hope that the downward trend continues in the harvest volume.
